


BIOGRAPHY

Born in 1930, Bishop Jude Saint-Antoine, a graduate in educational sciences, began a long career in teaching in 1956, the year of his priestly ordination by Cardinal Paul-Émile Léger, following his classical studies at *Collège de l'Assomption* and in theology at the *Grand Séminaire de Montréal*. He taught at *Collège de l'Assomption* and *Collège St. Paul* (as a member of its founding team). From 1961 to 1963, he studied at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, where he obtained a doctorate in spiritual theology. Published by Éditions Desclée et cie and Éditions Bellarmin in 1974, his thesis was on the writings of Fr. Paul Ragueneau, a Jesuit missionary in New France. He taught religious sciences from 1968 to 1975 at Collège Bois-de-Boulogne - formerly Collège St. Paul - where he was appointed to coordinate pastoral care services.

Bishop Saint-Antoine served as pastor at Saint-Benoit Parish in 1975. His motto was "Growing in the Church". May 22, 1981, marked the beginning of his episcopal ministry when he was ordained bishop by Archbishop Paul Grégoire at Mary Queen of the World Cathedral, and appointed titular bishop of Scardona. From 1979 to 1990, he was appointed Episcopal Vicar for the Central-west sector of the Diocese of Montreal, then from 1990 to 1998, Episcopal Vicar for Clergy and Director of the diocesan Office for Pastoral Personnel. During these years, he sat on several committees, particularly those involved in education, including the Catholic Committee for the *Conseil supérieur de l'éducation*, a Quebec council dedicated to higher education. He served as Visiting Bishop for the *Office de catéchèse du Québec* for eight years.

His confreres, whom he loved very much, admired his great capacity to listen and his generous availability to others. In keeping with the formation he received at the Grand Seminary, he was known for being contemplative and reflective, which was evident in the classical style of his homilies and the depth of his spirituality. His favourite reference book was the *Dictionnaire de Spiritualité* (*Dictionary of Spirituality*), comprised of 14 volumes!

Known for his distinguished and reserved nature, he enjoyed traveling and spending free time with his confreres. He devoted himself to several groups and was happy to serve in his various ministries. By 2006, having reached the age of retirement permitted by Canon Law, Bishop Saint-Antoine's resignation was accepted by Pope Benedict XVI, who relieved of him of his mandate as Auxiliary of Montreal. He continued to serve in Sunday ministry at Mary Queen of the World Cathedral and to be available to hear confessions several hours a week.
